As we begin a new year, the Friends of Ella K. McClatchy board has new leadership. I have volunteered here since 2015 and have served as the Sunroom Manager before being elected president.

I used to take my children to McClatchy when the children's room was where the computer room is now, sitting in a big cushy chair reading stories like we were at grandma's house. Though the configuration of books and services have changed since the 1980s, the atmosphere and hominess have not. Services have expanded to reflect technological advances and to meet the needs of the community which the McClatchy board is dedicated to supporting. How do we meet these needs? It's done in several ways.

Our Board works closely with our branch manager, Cara Latham, to create synergy and partnership between the Board and staff. McClatchy also receives generous financial donations for which we are grateful. We also raise money by encouraging people to become a Friend of McClatchy Library (a portion of the membership goes directly to McClatchy) and to visit our Sunroom Bookstore located off the children's room. All the proceeds from the Sunroom go to McClatchy Friends. Where do we get all the items we sell? Through generous donations from our community members like you. We have a team, led by Patti Teale, who sorts through all the donations and when we find a "treasure", it is sent to the Book Den and sold on Amazon. (McClatchy gets a portion of the net sale.) Spring and winter book sales at the branch offer a wider variety of books and audio-visual materials.

Please, McClatchy Friends -- If you haven't visited this branch lately, check out our new Sunroom, walk around the library and imagine the McClatchy family living there and enjoy Sacramento's unique treasure.

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### **Sharing Our Stories — Maryellen Burns**

Walk through the neighborhoods served by McClatchy Library on any given day and you'll find yourself surrounded by a living tapestry—broad trees overhead, historic homes leaning slightly with age, cats napping on porch steps, and the occasional hawk circling in the blue above. It's not just a place—it's a community in the truest sense of the word, full of people who know the value of where they live and what it means to be a part of something.

And yet, how often do we pause long enough to talk to the people around us—not just a wave or a quick hello, but a conversation that reveals something of ourselves? Sharing our stories with neighbors and listening to theirs is one of the most essential and rewarding acts we can engage in. It builds trust. It strengthens bonds. It reminds us that we are not alone in this fast-spinning world.

Every house here has a past. Some were once boarding houses, others the homes of prominent families or quiet artists. Trees on the block have survived windstorms, drought, and time. Longtime residents can recall the neighborhood when the trolley ran, or when milk was delivered. Newcomers, too, bring stories—of what drew them here, why they stayed, and how they see this place growing. These stories matter. They ground us.

Even the natural world around us whispers stories. The coyote that sometimes darts through an alley. The oak trees that have stood for generations. The scent of camellias in spring. These small wonders connect us to cycles of time and remind us that neighborhoods aren't just collections of houses—they're living ecosystems.

Many of us feel a pull toward community but don't always know how to start. The truth is it begins with something as simple as a conversation. A wave across the street becomes a smile. A shared concern over a lost pet becomes a friendship. Ask your neighbor about their house. Share what brought you here. Sit on your porch for an extra ten minutes and see who passes by.

Places like McClatchy Library make this even easier. It's more than just a library—it's a meeting place, a keeper of neighborhood history, and a quiet stage where local voices can speak. Imagine a neighborhood story night. A walking tour where residents tell the stories of their homes. A bulletin board where neighbors post memories. All of this starts with that first "hello."

As the world seems to move faster and communication becomes more virtual, the value of face-to-face connection becomes even more vital. When we share our stories, we affirm that this place matters. That we matter to each other. And in doing so, we help preserve the spirit of our community for the generations who will walk these sidewalks after us.

So, here's your invitation: Next time you're at the McClatchy Library tell someone your story. Ask to hear theirs. You may be surprised by what you learn—and how deeply it makes you feel at home.

## Big Day of Giving April 17 to May 1, 2025

Here's your opportunity to support the Friends of the Sacramento Public Library during this year's Big Day of Giving fundraising period, April 17 to May 1. This year the Friends will continue to put books in the hands of young readers through the Library's Book First and Children's Summer Reading programs.

The Library's goal is to support 13,000 students through Book First in 550 classrooms in underserved schools in Sacramento County during the 2025-2026 school year. These first-grade students will receive two books to keep and to help grow their reading skills.

The Library's Summer Reading program helps reach and support 15,000 youth readers to help them build on their learning during the school year and enable them thrive over the summer. Friends provide funds for a free book as a reward for children and teens who read at least five books during the summer break.

With your support on Big Day of Giving, the Friends will raise funds to allow the Library to purchase more than 50,000 books for kids through its Children's Summer Reading and Book First programs.

\$25 = Books to support 5 readers


\$75 = Books to support 15 readers

\$125 = Books for 25 readers (1 classroom)

\$300 = Books for 60 readers

\$500 = Book giveaway for 1 youth outreach event
