### From a Friend to a Friend:




## McClatchy Geocache



Someone places a container in a hidden area and posts its GPS coordinates online along with a small description of the location. Players use their phones or other GPS devices to see if they are "hot" or "cold" in their search to find the container.

# Ride and Read

The next time you ride SacRT light rail, you may find yourself stepping into a literary adventure. SacRT and the Sacramento Public Library have teamed up to create an immersive introduction to library services in the digital age.

It's called the Rolling Library Train. When you board the train, you will feel like you've walked into a cozy library. The interior walls are decorated with an artistic wrap depicting rows and rows of books on shelves.

The best part? Those "bookshelves" are dotted with hidden QR codes. It's a bit of a treasure hunt. Find a code, scan it with your smartphone camera, and you can instantly download a free ebook, an audiobook, or even a movie to watch as you ride or save it for later.

You can also read about online classes offered by the library system, including courses for high school diplomas and job training. Or learn how you can actually check out a lawn mower from the library. More importantly, the year-long library train program will showcase the ways in which a venerated public library system has been quietly but dramatically expanding its services in the digital era.

# The Very Best Gingerbread by Nancy Gotthart

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Butter & dust w/ flour a 9-inch spring-form cake pan.

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

- 2 cups unbleached all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp baking soda,
- 1 1/4 tsp kosher salt
- 1 tsp each ground cloves, cinnamon & ginger (These spices are best if you grind them yourself in a coffee grinder.)
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup dark molasses
- 1 cup canola oil
- 3 large eggs (at room temperature)
- 1 cup boiling water

#### **DIRECTIONS:**

Combine dry ingredients in a bowl & whisk together. In a generous mixing bowl, whisk (or beat) the sugar & wet ingredients until smooth, one or two minutes. Add dry ingredients to the wet & blend, scraping the bowl once or twice. Be gentle. If you over mix the batter it will be too thin & the cake tough.

Pour batter into prepared pan & bake for 55-60 minutes in the center of the oven. You may want to place a tray below to catch any possible drips. Test with a toothpick at 55 minutes (50, if you are very anxious); when it comes out clean, you're good to go. Place cake pan on a wire rack & let cool 15 or 20 minutes before removing the sides from the pan.

I recommend serving the gingerbread while it's still warm (but you knew that!), the only trouble being that it's hard to stop eating (but you knew that, too).

A word to the wise, ALWAYS use the best quality ingredients. Grinding your own spices freshly makes a whale of a difference in flavor. I prefer KING ARTHUR FLOUR, & I like canola oil because there is less oleaginous mouth-feel in the final product. An additional note: using another baking container, glass or ceramic, will change cooking time & the outcome of your effort.




